Scriptural Reflections

In our first reading from the book of Prophet Isaiah, the Servant of the Lord makes a prominent appearance in the second half of Isaiah's book. This servant represents all that is best in Israel, contrasting especially with the kings of Israel who did not serve God well. Isaiah's service during the disappointing reigns of King Ahaz and Hezekiah is recorded in the book's first half. Their search for security in worldly sources rather than in God weakened the kingdom and ultimately brought the kingdom to collapse and exile. But now there is hope for restoration. The Servant of the Lord becomes a source of inspiration for all those who await a brighter future for Israel.

What makes this servant so remarkable is total dedication to God's plan. Each day the servant is ready to listen to God's word. The servant does not rebel as so many others did in the years leading up to exile, especially the kings, even though their responsibility was to shepherd God's people. The "well-trained tongue" of the servant is clearly evident in the literary quality of the oracles associated with this portion of the book.

The servant must endure a great deal of resistance for rendering total service to God. The reading includes even personal injury intended to break the servant's resolve to carry out the important mission from God to speak to the weary of Israel. The people are weary because they have

suffered so much from the misguided polices of their leaders. But the servant has no fear of shame or disgrace. As a servant of the court of heaven, this ideal messenger has nothing to fear from anything this world might do to counter God's message.

Today the Church's liturgy proclaims the entire passion narrative of Mark. Passion in this case is passive. Jesus will not be the actor. He will be acted upon. He does not die but is killed. The narrative is not intended to be a historical eyewitness account about how Jesus was killed. It is a theological reflection on the meaning of Jesus' death and ultimately his resurrection. Much of this reflection will be influenced by the Church's reading of Scripture. Therefore, before reading the passion narrative of Mk, the priest or deacon is strongly encouraged to read carefully Ps 22 and Is 52:13—53:12.

Here in broad strokes is the way the passion narrative of Mk is constructed. I rely here on the work of Father Donald Senior who has dedicated much of his scholarly life to studying the passion narratives of the Gospels. A) Fidelity and Betrayal: The Passion Begins (Mk 14:1-11). B) The Final Passover (Mk 14:12-31). C) Gethsemane: Pray and Arrest (Mk 14:32-52). D) Confession and Denial: Interrogation by Sanhedrin (Mk 14:53-72). The Roman Trial (Mk 15:1-12). E) Crucifixion and Burial (Mk 15:21-47).
