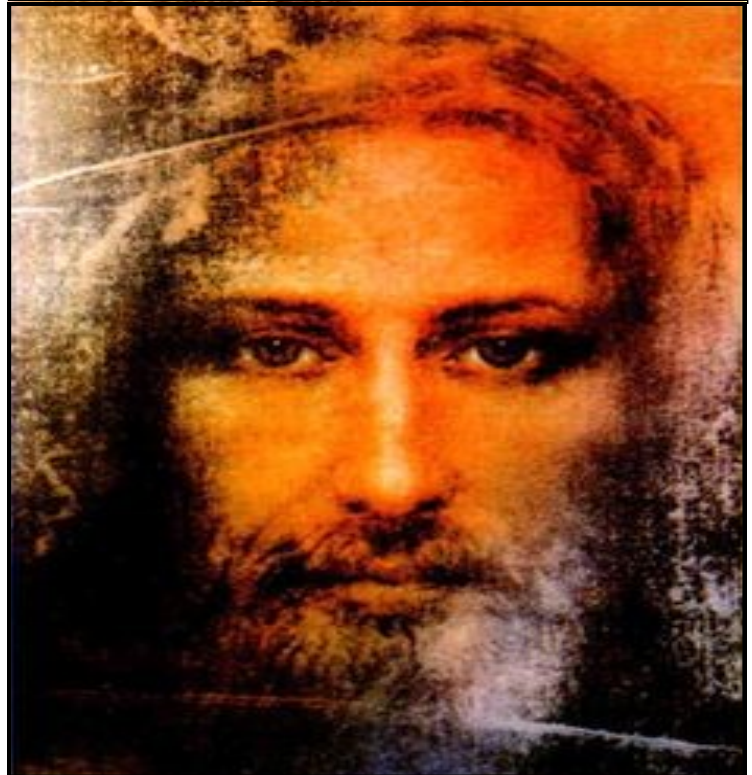

Fr. Flach Scriptural Reflections for the Feast of Christ Our King

"Who among us is worthy of grace? We are more like thieves who hung next to Jesus than we are like Jesus." Nancy Lynne Westfield in *Feasting on the Word*.

Bjornstjerne Bjornson, who won the 1903 Nobel Prize in Literature, is considered one of the four greatest Norwegian writers. Like many writers, Bjornson was very political. Once he so aroused the anger of the Norwegian Parliament that many of its members accused him of not being loyal to his country. He so inflamed Parliament that some of its members went to Bjornson's home to protest & to smash his windows. Feeling patriotic for what they had done to someone they considered a traitor, the protestors left Bjornson's house loudly singing the national anthem. Bjornson smiled as the angry members of Parliament marched away. They had evidently forgotten that it was Bjornson who had written the lyrics of their national anthem.

One of Luke's favorite techniques was the use of irony. Scholars usually refer to Luke's use of irony as his "Great Reversal." In story after story about Our Lord's teaching, Luke presents Jesus as beginning his teaching or parables with putting people's assumptions about God in a good light only to show them completely wrong by the end of the story.

A sign proclaiming the crime of a condemned man was always placed on a cross. We know that Pilate instructed the executions to put the sign, "This is the King of the Jews" on Jesus' cross as the description of Jesus' crime. The irony is that the sin was correct. Luke drives home the irony by describing how the rulers sneered & the soldiers jeered at Jesus. The worse came as another condemned man hanging on his own cross reviled Jesus. To prove that Jesus was completely powerless & not a king, that criminal sarcastically requested that Jesus save him & the others. Luke showed that Jesus' degradation was complete when another condemned criminal made fun of Him even as he, too was being put to death. We see the innocence of Jesus hanging next to complete depravity.

We see the contrast in the second criminal who, in admitting his own guilt, recognized the complete innocence of Jesus. Further, unlike the first criminal, he did not ask for Jesus to save him. He asked only to be remembered by Jesus. Who are we in this story? Are we in any way guilty of mocking Jesus? Of course we will say, "Absolutely not!" but we do not have to say it when our actions speak more loudly. The easiest example is when we have been guilty of mocking or jeering or being sarcastic with a person who did not deserve it. Spreading false gossip that

wrongly harms an innocent person is a participation in the sins of Pilate, the rulers, the soldiers & the first criminal.

Luke's great love of irony allowed Jesus to challenge our assumptions about God & about our own righteousness. His whole purpose in writing was to make clear to the people of his day-& to us-who that King really is; we must know who He is, for if we do not, we cannot possibly be true disciples.

The second criminal actually became a model of discipleship. He acknowledged his guilt & his unworthiness to approach Jesus with a request to save him. Even though the criminal did not ask Jesus to save him, his recognition of Jesus' innocence & the sin in his own life made it possible for Jesus to save him & to freely offer him a place in Paradise anyway.

Paradise is a word brought back from exile in Babylon. It was the hunting grounds of the king, a place only the king & those whom the king invited could go. We have a King who invites us to His Paradise. The rulers & soldiers had heard Jesus' claims of salvation, claims they mocked by saying, "If you are the one, then save yourself!" They had looked at salvation only in terms of physical salvation. For them, salvation would be the perpetuation of human existence. NO wonder they taunted by saying, "Go ahead, Jesus, save yourself. Let us see you come down from that cross! Let us see you live!" The irony is that Jesus did have salvation to offer, just not the salvation that they expected.

Jesus offered something totally unexpected. Today, we are called to a discipleship that acknowledges the King of the Universe for who He is, & in humility to accept the invitation to Paradise that we do not deserve but is offered to us anyway.

The Sacred Feast Of The Immaculate Conception of the

Feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the first instance of her conception, by a singular privilege and grace granted by GOD, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, the Savior of the human race, was preserved from all stain of original sin....

Why do we celebrate this holy day in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary? What does this special feast teach us? What are we to learn spiritually from this solemnity honoring the Mother of Jesus, the Son of God? Through this Solemnity, the Church reminds us of God's tremendous love for us in making it possible for Jesus to

enter our humanity through the chosen vessel of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Christians reasoned that the Son of God could not enter the world through something or someone touched by Original Sin. A perfect nature cannot be born from someone touched by a sinful nature. Today, we do not so much celebrate the Blessed Virgin Mary as we celebrate that God did something that made salvation possible. All of this, however, is about an act of God. What about today? When we received the Sacrament of Baptism, through the anointing with the oil of chrism & Baptism & the pouring of the Holy Water over our foreheads, we received the gift of Sanctifying Grace which brings to us the saving action of Christ thus freeing us from the effects of Original sin. Given to the Blessed Virgin Mary even prior to her conception, it allowed Mary to be born untouched by sin & left her open to constantly choose God's Will. On this Feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we celebrate that receiving this grace ourselves through Baptism, we have a power within us to defeat evil & to usher in grace & blessings. This feast teaches us what Mary could do by grace. Today's celebration reminds us of our own potential to foster God's Love in our everyday lives. We can be channels of goodness & light.
