Daily Mass Readings

Scriptural Reflections for Pentecost Sunday

Spiritual Reading for the Ascension of the Lord

The central idea in the liturgy today is the raising of our hearts toward heaven, so that we may begin to dwell in spirit where Jesus has gone before us. "Christ's Ascension," says Saint Leo, "is our own ascension; our body has the hope of one day being where its glorious head has preceded it." In fact, our Lord had already said in his discourse after the Last Supper, I go to prepare a place for you & if I shall go & prepare a place for you, I will come again & will take you to myself; that where I am, you also may be. The Ascension is, then, a feast of joyful hope, a sweet foretaste of heaven. By going before us, Jesus our head has given us the right to follow him there some day, & we can even say with Saint Leo, "In the person of Christ, we have penetrated the heights of heaven." As in Christ crucified we die

"When the Father sends his Word, he always sends his Breath [Spirit]. In their joint mission, the Son & the Holy Spirit are distinct but inseparable. To be sure, it is Christ who is seen, the visible image of the invisible God [Colossians 1:15], but it is the Spirit who reveals him" (CCC 689). "The Holy Spirit is at work with the Father & the Son from the beginning. But in these 'end times,' ushered in by the Son's redeeming Incarnation, the Spirit is revealed & given, recognized & welcomed as a person. Now can this divine plan, accomplished in Christ, the firstborn & head of the new creation, be embodied in mankind by the outpouring of the Spirit: as the Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, & the life everlasting" (CCC 686). These last five articles of the Creed are the Spirit's work too. All the rest of the Creed belongs to the Holy Spirit. The Creed is totally Trinitarian. It is not Trinitarian plus anything else. The Trinity has no postscripts. " Spirit does not speak of himself. The Spirit who 'has spoken through the prophets' makes us hear the Father's Word, but we do not hear the Spirit himself. We know him only by the movement by which he reveals the Word to us. The Spirit... 'will not speak on his own.' Such properly divine self-effacement... " (CCC 687) is remarkable. God is self-effacing! God is humble! How dare we be proud? Humility, subordination, submission, obedience to authority — this is very unpopular in our secular world, but it is the very life of the Trinity, the nature of God himself. It "goes all the way up." It is not merely a human virtue, it is certainly not an old-fashioned superstition; it is the nature of ultimate reality. No man was ever more obedient than Jesus Christ, God incarnate. Since it was not demeaning for God the Son to obey God the Father (they are equals!), it is not demeaning for human equals to obey each other: for children to obey their parents, wives their husbands, or citizens their rulers, as Scripture clearly commands (see Ephesians 5:21-6:9; Colossians 3:18; 4: 1, & Jesus' radical words in Matthew 20:20-28). Obedience means something totally different in the Christian life than it means in the world. It does not signify inferiority in any way. Christ was obedient to the Father, but he was equal to the Father in all things. The Spirit is equally divine, yet he is self-effacing. Therefore Scripture's command that some of us obey others "in Christ" in no way signifies inferiority, as it does in the world. We cannot speak of the invisible God directly, but only through visible symbols. Three of the most prominent symbols for the Holy Spirit in Scripture are water, fire, and the dove. "Water. The symbolism of water signifies the Holy Spirit's action in Baptism. Just as the gestation of our first birth took place in water, so the water of Baptism truly signifies that our birth into the divine life is given to us in the Holy Spirit" (CCC 694). Water is the most important element in nature: it is necessary for all life, it was the second thing God created, after light. It is the element most of us naturally love the most. Our favorite vacation spot is the sea. We have a mysterious love of moving water. And some of the great saints, like Saint Teresa of Avila, say it has taught them more than books. Jesus spoke of the Spirit as "living [moving] water": "Jesus stood up and proclaimed, 'If anyone thirst, let him come to me and drink. He who believes in me, as the Scripture has said, "Out of his heart shall flow rivers of living water.'" Now this he said about the Spirit, which those who believed in him were to receive" (John 7:37-39). Fire. God revealed himself to Moses in a burning bush. Scripture describes him as "a consuming fire" (Hebrews 12:29). Mystical experiences of him, such as Pascal's, often take that fiery form. 'Fire symbolizes the transforming energy of the Holy Spirit's actions. The prayer of the prophet Elijah, who 'arose like fire' and whose 'word burned like a torch,' brought down fire from heaven on the

sacrifice on Mount Carmel. This event was a 'figure' of the fire of the Holy Spirit, who transforms what he In the form of tongues 'as of fire,' the Holy Spirit rests touches. (Acts 2:3-4; on the disciples on the morning of Pentecost. CCC 696). The dove symbolizes peace, one of the most precious fruits of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22). "When Christ comes up from the water of his baptism, the Holy Spirit, in the form of a dove, comes down upon him and remains with him (CCC 701). The Spirit is both fire and peace, both fire and water; paradoxically opposite symbols from nature must be used to express adequately the One who transcends anything in nature.

Pope Francis: Pray The Rosary At 'This Time Of Trial'

As the coronavirus pandemic has led to many families praying together more, Pope Francis has invited the faithful to rediscover the beauty of praying the Rosary at home during May, the month of special devotions to the Blessed Virgin Mary: Below is the full text of the Pope's April 25 letter & the two accompanying prayers. "Dear brothers & sisters, the month of May is the approaching time when the People of God express 'with particular intensity their love--& devotion for the Blessed Virgin Mary. "It is traditional in this month to pray the Rosary at home within the family. The restrictions of the pandemic have made us come 'to appreciate all the more this 'family' aspect, also from a spiritual point of view. "For this reason, I want to encourage everyone to rediscover the beauty of praying the Rosary at home in the month of May. "This can be done as a group or individually; you can decide according to your own situations, making the most of both opportunities. The key to doing this is always simplicity, & it is easy also on the internet to find good models of prayers to follow. "I am also providing two prayers to Our Lady that you can recite at the end of the Rosary, & that I myself will pray in the month of May, in spiritual union with all of you. I include them with this letter so that they are available to everyone. "Dear brothers & sisters, contemplating the face of Christ with the heart of Mary our Mother will make us even more a spiritual family & will help us overcome this time of trial. "I keep all of you in my prayers, especially those suffering greatly, & I ask you, please, to pray for me. I thank you, & with great affection, I send you my blessing." ~ First Prayer ~ O Mary, you shine continuously on our journey as a sign of salvation & hope: We entrust ourselves to you, ' Health of the Sick, who; at the foot of the cross, were united with Jesus Suffering, & persevered in your faith. "Protectress of the Roman people," you know our needs, & we know that you will provide, so that, as at Cana in Galilee, joy & celebration may return after this time of trial. Help us, Mother of Divine Love to conform ourselves to the will of the Father & to do what Jesus tells us. For he took upon himself our suffering & burdened himself with our sorrows to bring us, through the cross, to the joy of the Resurrection. Amen. We fly to your protection, O Holy Mother of God; Do not despise our petitions in our necessities, but deliver us always from every danger, O Glorious & Blessed Virgin. ~ Second Prayer ~ "We fly to your protection, O Holy Mother of God." In the present tragic situation, when the whole world is prey to suffering & anxiety, we fly to you, Mother of God & our Mother, & seek refuge under your protection. Virgin Mary, turn your merciful eyes towards us amid this coronavirus pandemic. Comfort those who are distraught & mourn their loved ones who have died &, at times, are buried in a way that grieves them deeply. Be close to those who are concerned for their loved ones who are sick & who, in order to prevent the spread of the disease, cannot be close to them. Fill with hope those who are troubled by the

future & the consequences for the economy & employment. Mother of God & our Mother, pray for us to God, the Father of mercies, that this great suffering may end & that hope & peace may dawn anew. Plead with your divine Son, as you did at Cana, so that the families of the sick & the victims be comforted, & their hearts be opened to confidence & trust. Protect those doctors, nurses, health workers & volunteers who are on the front line of this emergency & are risking their lives to save others. Support their heroic effort & grant them strength, generosity & continued health. Be close to those who assist the sick night & day, & to priests who, in their pastoral concern & fidelity to the Gospel, are trying to help & support everyone. Blessed Virgin, illumine the minds of men & women engaged in scientific research may find effective solutions to over-come this virus. Support national leaders, that with wisdom, solicitude & generosity they may come to the aid of those lacking the basic necessities of life & may devise social & economic solutions inspired by far-sightedness & solidarity. Mary Most Holy, stir our consciences, so that the enormous funds invested in developing & stockpiling arms will instead be spent on promoting effective research on how to prevent similar tragedies from occurring in the future. Beloved Mother, help us realize that we are all members of one great family & to recognize the bond that unites us, so that, in a spirit of fraternity & solidarity, we can help to alleviate countless situations in poverty & need. Make us strong in faith, persevering in service, constant in prayer. Mary, consolation of the afflicted, embrace all your children in distress & pray that God will stretch out his all-powerful hand & free us from this terrible pandemic, so that life can serenely resume its normal course. To you, who shine on our journey as a sign of salvation & hope, do we entrust ourselves, O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary. Amen.
