

Meditation on the Roman Catholic Belief of Purgatory ~ This Meditation is a Three Part Series being published.

Part 3. Purgatory is a place where the Love of God tempers the Justice of God, but also where the love of man tempers the injustice of man, for it enables hearts who are left behind to break the barriers of time & death, to convert unspoken words into prayers, unburned incense into sacrifice, unoffered flowers into alms, & undone acts of kindness into help for eternal life. Take away purgatory & how bitter would be our grief for our unkindnesses & how piercing our sorrow for our forgetfulness.... But if there be a purgatory, then immediately the bowed head gives way to a bent knee, the moment of silence to a moment of prayer, & the fading wreath to the abiding offering of the sacrifice of that great Hero of heroes, Christ. Purgatory, then, enables us to atone for our ingratitude because through our prayers, mortifications, & sacrifices, it makes it possible to bring joy & consolation to the ones we love. Love is stronger than death & hence there should be love for those who have gone before us. We are the offspring of their life, the gathered fruit of their labor, the solicitude of their hearts.

November 11, 2018 ~ Thirty~Second Sunday in Ordinary Time ~ From The Pastor

A poor widow is down to her last handful of flour and a few tablespoons of oil; she fully expects that when these items are gone she and her son will die. Then Elijah shows up asking for water and bread. She decides to trust him, and God delivers miraculous jars of flour and oil that sustain her and her son for a full year. In Mark's gospel, Jesus tells of another nameless widow whom he observes in the Temple. He knows she is poor, yet she bravely deposits her pittance in the treasury, undaunted by the showy offerings of the rich who precede and follow her. Like Elijah's widow at Zarephath, she trusts God and gives until it hurts, and Jesus pronounces her gift as the greatest in God's eyes. As I pondered the courageous faith of these two widows, I was reminded of a favorite short story by Oscar Wilde. At the heart of the tale of "The Happy Prince" is a gilded and bejeweled statue mounted on a tall column. The locals call the anonymous prince "happy" because of his beatific smile. A little swallow takes shelter at the feet of the statue. But the heart of the statue's spirit—who once has been a living prince—is not happy. He explains to the little swallow that, in life, he has been pampered and had only known beauty; but now from on high, he can see all the misery in his city, and so he cannot help but weep. He elicits the swallow's aid, asking his tiny friend to take the ruby from the hilt of his sword to a widow whose son is very ill. As the prince observes other suffering people, he relies on the swallow to deliver his two sapphire eyes and his gold leaf covering to them. Warmed by kindness and friendship, the swallow ignores the onset of winter until it is too late and dies at the statue's feet, which causes the leaden heart within the statue to crack. The townspeople, noticing that the statue is no longer beautiful, decide to melt it down and replace it, but the broken heart of lead will not melt. God sends an angel to bring him the most valuable things in the town and is pleased to receive the tiny body of the swallow and the broken heart of the happy prince. God promises eternal happiness to them both.

Scriptural Reflections ~ Thirty~Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus knows the full worth of the poor widow who contributes to the Temple treasury "all she had, her whole livelihood." Although her alms financially amounted to almost nothing, she remained certain that God would be pleased with her sacrifice. For, more than her money, she sacrificed to God the last shreds of her self-sufficiency. Like the widow of Zarephath, she believed in a bounty beyond her meager means. "The jar of flour shall not go empty," for it has become the Bread of Life, Jesus, who provides for those who make their lives a total gift of self to him. In that action, we discover full worth. That is what Christ presents to the Father as he "appears before God on our behalf."

Spiritual Reading for the Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

My daughter, I want to instruct you on how you are to rescue souls through sacrifice and prayer. You will save more souls through prayer and suffering than will a missionary through his teachings and sermons alone. I want to see you as a sacrifice of living love, which only then carries weight before me. You must be annihilated, destroyed, living as if you are dead in the most secret depths of your being. You must be destroyed in that secret depth where human eye has never penetrated; then I will find in you a pleasing sacrifice, a holocaust full of sweetness and fragrance. And great will be your power for whomever you intercede. Outwardly, your sacrifice must look like this: silent, hidden, permeated with love, imbued with prayer. I demand, my daughter, that your sacrifice be pure and full of humility, that I may find pleasure in it. I will not spare my grace, that you may be able to fulfill what I demand of you. I will now instruct you on what your holocaust shall consist of, in everyday life, so as to preserve you from illusions. You shall accept all sufferings with love. Do not be afflicted if your heart often experience repugnance and dislike for sacrifice. All its power rests in the will, and so these contrary feelings, far from lowering the value of the sacrifice in my eyes, will enhance it. Know that your body and soul will often be in the midst of fire. Although you will not feel my presence on some occasions, I will always be with you. Do not fear; my grace will be with you. The story of Elijah




and the widow of Zarephath is one of the most compelling exemplifications of what Saint John Paul II called "the law of the gift," namely, that one's being increases in the measure that one gives it away.

During a time of terrible

drought, Elijah comes upon the widow, and he boldly asks that she give him something to eat and drink. When she explains that all she has left is enough to make a last meal for herself and her son, the prophet persists: Make me a little cake and bring it to me. She must have shaken her head in disbelief, but nonetheless, she acquiesces. Then the miracle occurred: She was able to eat for a year; the jar of flour did not go empty, nor the jug of oil run dry. By an instinct born of aeons of evolution, we seek to hang on to what we have, to cling to our possessions, to defend our lives at all costs. But in the spiritual order this instinct is counter-indicated, for in regard to the things of God, grasping leads, not to gain, but to loss. Though he was in the form of God, Jesus did not deem equality with God something to be grasped at. Rather he emptied himself... (Phil 2:6-7a). Therefore, if you want the divine life in you never to run out, don't hang on to it. Give it away! And you will find it increasing in you thirty, sixty, and a hundredfold.
